STATUTORY RULES.

No. 3 of 1928.

Made under the Native Crown Servants Ordinance, 1897-1917.

- 1. Any native servant of the Government who without reasonable excuse absents himself from the work for which he was engaged when he ought lawfully to be at such work or neglects or refuses to perform or complete any work allotted to him or amend any work previously assigned to him which has been carelessly or improperly performed shall be guilty of a breach of the provisions of these Regulations.
- 2. Any native servant of the Government employed at any Government Station outside a town who is away from the quarters which have been assigned either permanently or temporarily to him at any time after 9 p.m. and before daylight of the following morning without the permission of the officer who is for the time being in charge of such servant or other reasonable excuse shall be guilty of a breach of the provisions of these Regulations.
