

STATUTORY RULES.

No. 6 of 1919.

Made under *The Native Regulation Ordinance of 1908.*

(XXV. of 1909).

1. Regulation 82A contained in Statutory Rules No. 4 of 1919, made under *The Native Regulation Ordinance of 1908*, is repealed.

2. The Regulations dealing with native matters made under *The Native Regulation Ordinance of 1908* on the fifteenth day of March, 1911, as amended by Statutory Rules No. 11 of 1917, are further amended by adding after Regulation 82A the following new Regulation :—

“82B. (1) To prevent the spread of any infectious disease (whether or not the same shall actually exist in the Territory) the Lieutenant-Governor may, by Order in Council, direct that all natives living in the localities named in the Order or engaged in any specified calling shall present themselves, their children, and wards to such persons as are mentioned in the Order and at such places and at such times as a Magistrate directs and submit themselves, their children, and wards to inoculation against such infectious disease.

(2) The said natives shall obey such Order, and in default may be forcibly inoculated and shall be liable to a fine not exceeding Ten pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for any period not exceeding six months.”
