STATUTORY RULES.

Made under the Native Taxes Ordinance, 1917-1924.

The Native Taxes (Funds) Regulations, 1930 (Statutory Rules No. 9 of 1930) are amended as follows:—

- 1. By repealing Regulation 8 thereof and substituting the following new regulation in lieu thereof:—
 - "8. The authorized sum may be annually paid out of Native Education Fund as to forty-sixty-firsts thereof to the London Missionary Society and the Roman Catholic Mission in equal proportions as to sixteen-sixty-firsts to the Kwato Extension Association and as to the remaining five-sixty-firsts to the Methodist Missionary Society to be expended by them on both the primary and technical education of natives according to the several schemes heretofore approved by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council under the Native Taxes (General Purposes) Regulations, 1921 (Statutory Rules No. 9 of 1921), since repealed."
- 2. By repealing the figure "2" appearing in the column headed "Authorized Sum" in the line representing Schedule Item Number 2 under the heading "Native Education Fund" and substituting the figure "0" in lieu thereof.
- 3. By adding after Regulation 23 thereof the following new regulation and heading:—

 "Infant welfare work in native villages.

23A. The authorized sum may be annually paid out of the Native Benefits Fund to the Kwato Extension Association and the Seventh Day Adventist Mission in the proportions of eight-thirteenth to the former and five-thirteenths to the latter to be expended by them in the establishment of infant clinics and for the general prevention of infant mortality in native villages."

4. By adding immediately after the line representing Schedule Item 7 under the heading "Native Benefits Fund" the following new line:—

"23A | - | - | - | Infant Welfare Work in Native Villages | 7A | £650 | - | -"
