By His Excellency SIR JOHN HUBERT PLUNKETT MURRAY, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Lieutenant-Governor of the Territory of Papua.

WHEREAS by the *Quarantine Ordinance*, 1913-1922, it is amongst other things enacted that the Lieutenant-Governor may, by Proclamation, declare that any place beyond the said Territory is infected with a quarantinable disease or that a quarantinable disease may be brought or carried from or through that place, and thereupon and so long as the Proclamation remains in force that place shall be a proclaimed place within the meaning of the said Ordinance:

And whereas it is desirable to proclaim that certain places beyond the said Territory are infected with the quarantinable diseases cholera, plague, smallpox and yellow fever, or are places from or through which such diseases may be brought or carried:

Now, therefore, I, the Lieutenant-Governor aforesaid, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, and in pursuance of the

powers vested in me by the said Ordinance, do hereby declare—

- (1) that the following places beyond the said Territory are infected with cholera, or that cholera may be brought or carried from or through them to the said Territory:—

WHEREAS by an Ordinance intituled the *Quarantine Ordinance*, 1913-1938, it is amongst other things provided that the Lieutenant-Governor may by Proclamation declare any place or area in the Territory to be a landing-place for vessels engaged in navigation by air:

And whereas it is further provided by the said Ordinance that the Lieutenant-Governor may by proclamation appoint a place to be a landing-place for vessels engaged in navigation by air subject to quarantine:

Now, therefore, I, the Lieutenant-Governor aforesaid, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare the places or areas described in the First Schedule hereto to be landing-places for vessels engaged in navigation by air:

And, I do further proclaim and declare that the places described in the Second Schedule hereto are appointed landing-places for vessels engaged in navigation by air subject to quarantine.

AERODROME (LAND)—KILA KILA.

Commencing at a concrete survey post being the North-West corner of Portion 52 District 8 and bounded thence by lines bearing $121^{\circ} 19'$ for a distance of 1,867.4 links bearing $31^{\circ} 19'$ for a distance of 257.5 links bearing $121^{\circ} 19'$ for a distance of 969.6 links bearing $211^{\circ} 19'$ for a distance of 257.5 links bearing $121^{\circ} 19'$ for a distance of 3,679.5 links bearing $211^{\circ} 19'$ for a distance of 700 links bearing $301^{\circ} 19'$ for a distance of 6,836.5 links bearing $31^{\circ} 19'$ for a distance of 742 links and bearing $128^{\circ} 50'$ for a distance of 323 links to the point of commencement. AERODROME (SEA)—PORT MORESBY HARBOUR.

Commencing at a point being the North-Western corner of Paga Point and bounded thence on the South-West by a line bearing $304^{\circ} 00'$ for a distance of $16\frac{1}{2}$ chains to the red light beacon on the South end of the Logolu-Motu-Motu Reef; thence on the West by a line bearing $5^{\circ} 51'$ for a distance of 1,105 links to the red light beacon on the North end of Logolu-Motu-Motu Reef; thence on the North by a line bearing $81^{\circ} 30'$ for a distance of $54\frac{1}{2}$ chains to the high-water mark of the Port Moresby Harbour; thence South-Westerly and Westerly along the said high-water mark to the point of commencement. All bearings true.

AERODROME (SEA)—DARU ROADSTEAD.

Moresby and to be notified by such officer in writing to the person in
charge of the ship.

AT SAMARAI.⁽¹⁾

The Port of Samarai as such Port is defined by Proclamation⁽²⁾
dated the sixteenth day of November, 1889, and published in the
British New Guinea *Government Gazette* of the 23rd November, 1889,
No. 14, Vol. II. The exact spot in such Port at which any particular
ship is to remain whilst she is in quarantine to be determined by a
Resident Magistrate or Sub-Collector of Customs at Samarai, and to
be notified by such officer in writing to the person in charge of the
ship.

AT THE ISLAND OF DARU.

The channel or straits between the Island of Daru and the Island
of New Guinea. The exact spot in such channel or straits at which
any particular ship is to remain whilst she is in quarantine to be
determined by a Resident Magistrate or Sub-Collector of Customs
at Daru and to be notified by such officer in writing to the person in
charge of the ship.

The point known as Paga Point at Port Moresby. Commencing at a peg at low water mark at Sanitary Point, Port Moresby; thence bounded on the north-east by a line bearing south-east to low water mark of Walter Bay; and bounded thence on the south-east, south, and west by low water mark of Walter Bay and Port Moresby bearing generally south-west, north-west, and north to the point of commencement; and

The whole of the island of Daugo down to low water mark to be places at which passengers may perform quarantine; and

The whole of the island of Gesila (near Samarai) down to low water mark to be a place at which passengers may perform quarantine.

WHEREAS by an Ordinance (No. 6 of 1913) intituled the *Quarantine Ordinance*, 1913, it is amongst other things enacted that the Lieutenant-Governor may by proclamation fix the position of the quarantine line for any port: Now, therefore, I, the Lieutenant-Governor aforesaid, by and with the consent of the Executive Council, and in pursuance of the powers vested in me by the said Ordinance, do hereby proclaim and declare that the position of the line as described in the Schedule hereto shall be the position of the quarantine line for Port Moresby within the meaning of Section 25 of the said Ordinance, inside of which line vessels shall not enter until granted pratique.

Commencing at the North-Western corner of Paga Point, and bounded thence on the South-West by a line bearing $301^{\circ} 8'$ for about $15\frac{1}{2}$ chains to the red light beacon on the South end of the Logolu-motu-motu reef; thence on the West by a line bearing $3^{\circ} 32'$ for about 1,140 links to the red light beacon on the North end of the Logolu-motu-motu reef; thence on the North by a line bearing $81^{\circ} 15'$ for about 54 chains to the high water mark of Port Moresby harbour; and thence South-Westerly and Westerly along the said high water mark to the point of commencement—all bearings true.
